Would I buy it, well I really do like it, but I'm not sure that it's worth \$70.00, especially when I can pick up a 12-year-old Glenfiddich for around \$30.00 a bottle.

I mean how the hell do they work out prices for their whisky, not just Diageo all of them? I get that a whisky might be more expensive if it is a limited release, but a general release bottle like this one, come on!

I suggest that you do as I have done and try it in a bar, who knows, after trying it, you may think it's worth \$70.00 a bottle.

Nose - Floral, fruit & heather.


Palate - Berries, honey & peach.



What's the difference? I believe that most people would recognize a "whisky bar," as a bar with hundreds of whiskies, whereas a bar that sells whiskies, in my mind would be a bar that at least sells a decent selection of whiskies, so not a "whisky bar" per se, but a darn sight better than a lot of bars, that seem hard pressed to offer two or three low end whiskies.
